I recently had the opportunity to serve at Thrive Youth Group's In-Town Retreat. It was a jam-packed weekend where 45 students slept over at the church, took a day trip to Nanaimo, worshipped the Lord with our guest band

from Pacific Life Bible College, and heard a good word from our speaker, Trevor Finstad. This was a great way to get to know my youth girls on a deeper level within a longer span of time together! On Saturday evening, during our last worship session together, one of the band members shared this analogy with us:

As Christians, we can often treat Sunday church or Youth Group during the week as the only time we can encounter and show our passion for the Lord. What we really should be doing is treating these two or three times a week spent at church like the time a sports team spends in a locker room while preparing before a game. The moment we enter our schools, workplaces, homes, is when we are 'playing the game' and that's when we should be putting what we've practiced and our best efforts forward.

This analogy has so much truth within it. I found that this really spoke to many of the students, but also to the leaders in the room.

Matthew 5:6 says, "In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."

Since hearing this, I've been able to encourage others and myself not to keep our faith within four walls, but to continue to worship him wherever you go and with whomever you encounter!



#### Robbie Taylor Engaging in Relationships

Recently I was asked to speak at a local church. As I was pondering what God would have me share, I found myself in a story that is quite familiar to many, and has that catchy song about a

'wee man'! Yes, if you haven't guessed it yet, it was Zacchaeus, from Luke 19. I was struck by how Jesus approaches this man, who was constantly looked down upon because of his height, as well as his role as a despised tax collector. Jesus' purpose and intent is to seek and save the lost, and this story reveals Jesus' heart for those far from him.

There are three things Jesus did in this passage that serve to remind and encourage me about how we should live in light of those around us, and how we should engage the youth we work with each week.

1) Jesus seeks out and engages the one who is lost, the one rejected and marginalized by society and culture and the organized religion of the day. Jesus, amongst a huge crowd, sought out Zacchaeus. Jesus saw a man and engaged him; we see that Jesus looked at him, acknowledged him by name, and connected relationally by giving him a personal invitation to spend time with him.

2) Jesus journeys and stays with the lost. Jesus, despite his busy plans, and despite heading to Jerusalem to fulfil his earthly mission, chose to walk with Zacchaeus despite the judgment of the religious leaders. Jesus chose to pursue this relationship, empowered by the love of God the Father, and spent time with a man who needed it. Jesus spent time in the world of those who were lost.

3) Jesus changes the hearts of the lost. Jesus spent time with Zacchaeus in his home, eating his food. Jesus' presence changed Zacchaeus' heart, and in this account we see a man surrender to Jesus and sacrifice what he has for the sake of others. Again, we see that Jesus' presence has the power to save and transform.

Who is in our lives? Who should we be intentional with? Do we see the needs of others and choose to love them and seek them out? Do we believe that investing in God's kingdom, and making time for those far from Him, is important?

Let God's love empower you, let the heart of Jesus in you guide you. I encourage you to have the same mind as Jesus: to seek out those around you, make opportunities to invite people into your lives, and love others with the expectation and faith that Jesus' powerful love will change their hearts.
