In 2 Kings 5, we meet a man called Naaman. He was a leader of the Syrian army who defeated Israel in battle and captured young teens after killing off their families, and those teens were used

He needed healing. In the story, we see an Israelite teenage slave girl who chose to believe the goodness and heart of God over her circumstances, and who overcame unforgiveness against someone who had destroyed her family and future. This teenage girl declared to Naaman's wife how the God of Israel would heal him, and that God's heart is to heal his creation.
